New downtown mural symbolizes city's coming together after April 25 tornado

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Professional artist Ashley Greer is creating a new mural in downtown Ruston to remind at sending your spirits soaring.

The roughly 15-foot-tall by 24-foot-long mural on the east wall of the JACO Federal Credit Union building that faces Vienna Street will feature stylized rainbow, the "Ruston Strong" slogan adopted after the April 25 tornado, and balloons.

Greer said the mural is dedicated to the memory of victims Kendra Butler, 35, and her 14-year-old son Remington. They died when a tree crashed into their Evans Street home.

The mural, commissioned by the city, is also meant as a reminder of how Ruston united following the storm, Greer said.

"Day 4 after the tornado, I had the thought 'wouldn't it be good if we had a Ruston Strong

mural,'" Greer said. "It would be a constant reminder of how our community came together in the face of a tragedy that affected so many. We wanted to always remember that in some form."

Before the tornado ripped through, the city had already been planning to add another downtown mural, Tori Davis, Ruston's Main Street director and community coordinator, said.

The immediate outpouring of community support after the storm spawned the idea for the next mural, she said.

Davis and Greer met by chance at a Main Street meeting several months after the storm.

"All the pieces just sort of fell into place," Davis said.

The JACO wall was already

on a list of possible mural locations pegged by a Louisiana Tech University student study.

Greer began working on the mural Nov. 15. She said the peach color theme at the end of the words "Ruston Strong" is a symbol of the rainbow after the storm, the moment when the people, all the city came together and uplifted each other."

Friday's rain kept Greer from finishing the mural by week's end. Three balloons that passerby can appear to be holding are what remain in to be painted. That's for people who want to take pictures in front of the mural, Greer said.

Each person who's holding a balloon is being uplifted," she said.

Davis said the city's downtown mural initiative — there are already municipally commissioned murals on downtown buildings — help give Ruston a sense of place.

The artworks are also a visible sign of the city's commitment to the arts, she said.

Parish schools not hit by flu bug

It seems a recent outbreak of the flu some 30 miles east of Ruston did not affect Lincoln Parish students in their last week of school before Thanksgiving break.

While more than 900 students and many staff members at West Monroe High School were out with the flu-like symptoms last week according to a KNOE-TV report, Lincoln Parish Schools Superintendent Mike Milstead said things have held steady locally.

"The Lincoln Parish School system is experiencing normal absences for the week of Nov. 11-22," Milstead said Friday. "Attendance rates remain about 95%. We have seen some higher than normal absenteeism at the Lincoln Parish Early Childhood Center related mainly to strep throat, as well as a few cases of Cypress Springs."

According to the Centers for Disease Control, Louisiana showed the highest levels of influenza-like illness in the country in the week ending Nov. 9, the last week for which data is available.

With flu activity increasing in the region, Milstead said having students out of school for the holiday this week was a lucky break.

"We are fortunate that the Thanksgiving holiday is occurring at this time," he said. "With that, we remain optimistic we can get past this initial outbreak presently occurring at other school systems in north Louisiana."

Lincoln Parish students will return to class on Dec. 2.
